Have you done the math?

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DETERMINATION // SQUIRREL // PLUM

Have you ever seen a squirrel trying to dine at a bird feeder? These crafty critters often succeed at snagging a meal, despite squirrel-deterring obstacles. They are clever and persistent rodents.

In fact, the ability of eastern gray squirrels to solve problems has contributed to their "invasion" of Great Britain. Worldwide, there are more than 200 types of squirrels, including tree, ground, and flying squirrels. (Technically, flying squirrels glide rather than fly.) More than half of all squirrels are tree squirrels.

They can climb in any direction, thanks to double-jointed back legs and sharp claws. As foragers, they're always on the hunt for nuts, buds, and seeds. Before winter, they bury acorns and other food items in different locations. Researchers have discovered that the process isn't as random as it looks; squirrels organize their "cache" by quality and variety!

Because squirrels hide more food than they dig up, the extra seeds and nuts will sprout and grow come spring. This process is called seed dispersal, and we have squirrels to thank for many new trees.

They use their powerful sense of smell to locate their buried treasure and to get information about other squirrels. They also communicate with flicks of their tails, showing frustration. If a hawk or other danger appears, they sound an alarm call. Different combinations of tail movements with sounds – chirps, clicks, or whistles – can signal whether a predator is on the ground or lurking above.

What about that zig-zag running?
That's to throw off pursuers until a tree can be found. And, believe it or not, squirrels really do find most of those buried acorns!

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First described as a color more than two centuries ago, plum takes its name from the reddishpurple fruit in the genus Prunus. It's a frequent hue in winter decorating, with sugar plums as a holiday treat, for instance. Plum is considered an opulent color, suggesting luxury. Though it has a red component, it is perceived as cool. Plum blossoms appear in late winter, signaling the arrival of spring around the corner. Plum trees are hardy and associated with resilience, especially in many Asian cultures.

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
